



SEPO Library: Author Recommendations By Reva Allen

Those of you who use the SEPO library probably have noticed that we have quite a few series of books written by various authors. This article provides information about some of those authors who may not be as familiar to you as Clark, Baldacci, Patterson, Roberts, Steel, and Sparks. I hope you enjoy trying out some of them.

- Isabel Allende: highly-regarded Chilean-American novelist. We have 6 of her works.
- Emily Brightwell: author of the Mrs. Jeffries cozy mysteries set in Victorian England. We have 25 of the 41 books in the series.
- Ann Cleeves: has written 5 murder mystery series. The current BBC TV series Vera is based on one of these. We have 11 of her books.
- Jennifer Chiaverini: author of the Elm Creek Quilts series, novels about a group of quilters and some Civil War- and Depression-era ancestors of the main character. We have most of the books in the series.
- Lynn Kurland: author of two intertwining series of time-travel romances. We have about 20 of her books, including some stories included in 3-4 of our romance anthology books.
- Sophie Hannah: author of the Zailer & Waterhouse Mystery series of psychological thrillers, which follow the work of two British police inspectors who have their own psychological quirks. She also is the author of a new series of Hercule Poirot mysteries, which have been authorized by the estate of Agatha Christie.
- J. A. Jance: author of 4 series of murder mysteries. We have most of her books.
- Iris Johansen: author of 3 mystery series. We have almost all of her books.
- Catherine Coulter: author of 2 mystery series having FBI agents as lead characters. We have 26 of her 33 books.
- Hope Ramsay: we have 7 of her Last Chance romance novels.
- Emily March: we have 9 of her Eternity Springs romance novels.

Our books are shelved alphabetically by author and then title. If you want to read books in series in chronological order, I suggest you Google a web site such as <u>www.bookseriesinorder.com</u> to obtain a list of the author's works in order.



Since there cannot be a Law Enforcement Office on every corner, citizen involvement is essential to prevent crime. And we are the ones who know what is going on at Sunshine. By cooperating with each other, Sunshine residents can help fight crime in a very effective way – before it begins!

Neighborhood Watch is undoubtedly one of the oldest and well-known crime prevention programs. This concept began in the late 1960's in response to increasing burglary rates. The roots of NW can actually be traced all the way back to Colonial Days when night watchmen patrolled the settlements and streets.

The modern-day version of NW was developed because of requests from Sheriffs and Police Departments around the country who were looking for a crime prevention program. The intent would incorporate citizen involvement and address the increasing number of burglaries taking place especially in suburban areas. In 1972, the National Sheriffs Association took the concept a step further by seeking funding to make the program a national initiative.

The first two years of the program focused primarily on disseminating info on the nature and volume of burglary and securing residential property to make it less vulnerable to break-ins. From there it evolved into a program that promoted the establishment of ongoing local NW groups. This effort encouraged citizens to partner with their local Law Enforcement Agencies in an effort to reduce various types of "neighborhood crime".

Since its inception, NW has grown from an "extra pair of eyes and ears" approach to a much more proactive program. Our community-oriented endeavor provides a unique infrastructure that brings together our LE (both Combes and Harlingen) and citizens for the protection of their community. In fact, come August – Harlingen will have a National Night Out program at Lon C Hill Park across from Harlingen PD and in October, Combes celebrates their NNO in the park across from the Combes Police Department.

So, we are very lucky. Some responsibilities of NW members might be to learn neighbor's names, be able to recognize their vehicles and be alert to unusual or



suspicious behavior. Be alert to unusual or suspicious behavior. Call the PD – do not take any risks to prevent crime or try to make an arrest. REPORT the crime - include the activity (car stolen, break-in from back door, etc). Watch your neighbor's home when they are going home ("up North"). Ask them to return the favor..... Don't leave a signal that says "no one is home". Pick up the newspapers. Be involved – it is the most effective way to reduce/prevent crime and make Sunshine safe.

If a crime occurs - report it..... Harlingen Police Department 956 216 5940

Some good "report" notes to take What occurred, When, Where, What

Where are the Bad Guys heading? Etc. (take a minute, compose your thoughts)

Any guns etc.????? Vehicle - make model color etc. is good info. License Plate.

No fact it too trivial – How many suspects were there? What did they do? What did they say? What did they take? Which way did they go? Any other witnesses?? Who, names, addresses & phone numbers?

NW Patrol Schedule: Mary Grande makes the schedule for NW Patrol which is done every night. When and if you choose to join the Neighborhood Watch, you will be fully oriented. Mary Grande and I (and a few other neighbors) have taken the Harlingen Citizens Police Academy course. We attend their monthly meetings at the Harlingen PD. Chief Quill in Combes also is very aware of our community and our NW efforts.

Block Captains and Co-Captains: These special volunteers make the NW tick. All nine streets ideally should have a volunteer Block Captain as a point of contact. The Co-Captains would be those volunteers who are next door to four or six homes – just keeping an eye out. This is simply for communication. This key person is an integral component in keeping the block – the street actively informed - from crime prevention efforts to exchange of information. The NW can flourish or dwindle. These suggestions are not all inclusive. Developing a comms system assists in distributing vital info to your neighbors. Facilitate the unity. Get new residents involved. Obtain their support. Rekindle older connections of residents who have gotten away from the mission. Remind your street of an upcoming meeting. Block captains and Co-Captains are the glue.
